Funny Where Going to Church Will Lead You

Mid-August my parish, Our Lady of the Holy Angels, had a guest speaker at all weekend masses. Father Carl Chudy, Provincial Superior of the Xaverian Missionaries. I was always captivated by the work of missionaries. I remember that after our Cursillo weekends, over 33 years ago, my husband and I considered becoming lay missionaries. In fact we wrote to the Maryknolls seeking information; I cannot remember their exact response but I have a feeling that the fact that we carried with us five children, including twins less than a year old, dampened their enthusiasm of having the Kalembe's join them. But I looked forward to hearing about Father Carl's missionary adventures. As he went on with his talk I quickly realized that this was not the usual missionary discourse, but rather a call for inward reflection and appeal for understanding and peace between cultures and religions. He spoke of the current unrest between religious and political factions propagated by inflammatory media coverage. Although he never directly referred to the current conflict surrounding the Cordoba Islamic Cultural Center and Mosque to be built in NYC, that immediately came to mind. Father Carl was not taking sides, he was appealing to reason, reason based on the teachings of Christ. His call was that of Christ, love one another, not to succumb to the hysteria of the moment but to educate ourselves and act prudently and tolerantly. He ended with a suggestion that we go home and Google Christian/Muslim Dialogue.

I did and came across Pontifical Council for Interreligious Dialogue; funny where going to church will lead you. The piece that caught my eye was "A Message for the End of Ramadan September 2009; Christians and Muslims: Together in Overcoming Poverty, written to Muslims by the Pontifical Council's president Jean-Louis Cardinal Turuan. It acknowledges that poverty is a global interreligious issue and must be addressed together by people of all religions. "3...We all know that poverty has the power to humiliate and to engender intolerable sufferings; it

is often a source of isolation, anger, even hatred and the desire for revenge. It can provoke hostile actions using any available means, even seeking to justify them on religious grounds, or seizing another man's wealth, together with his peace and security, in the name of an alleged "divine justice". This is why confronting the phenomena of extremism and violence necessarily implies tackling poverty through the promotion of integral human development that Pope Paul VI defined as the "new name for peace..."

Then I remembered reading an article in the National Catholic Reporter (July 29, 2010) by Benedictine Sister Joan Chittister entitled About that Other Shoe. Back to Google I went and brought it up. The article recalls a conflict that has similarities to the current one related to the proposed mosque. Sister Chittister recalls that in 1984 a group of Catholic nuns and bishops were determined to build a Carmelite convent on the grounds of the Auschwitz death camp; grounds Jews consider sacred because they are the burial grounds of their dead killed at the hands of Christians.

A major conflict grew. Jews looked on it as a sacrilege for Catholics to build on the burial ground of their loved ones. Catholics could not understand how they could be so misunderstood. They felt they were hallowing the ground by placing a cloistered community there to pray for those who died there.

The conflict took years to resolve and in the end the Catholics, led by the Pope, moved the location of the convent to a less provocative site and opened up an educational center devoted to peace and unity between Christians and Jews. Sister Chittister reminds us now the shoe is on the other foot. She, as Father Carl, does not take sides but suggests that there has to be another way to deal with the sensitivity of both sides. There needs to be a way to peace and healing or fear and mistrust will prevail. Funny where going to church will lead you. Follow the "new name for peace".

Let those who have ears hear!

How can I serve God and my community?
How can I best put my talents to work?

Such questions are at the heart of the Cursillo mission – and, indeed, many Group Reunion discussions. Certainly, many of us struggle for years to find the right answers.

At their parish in Park Ridge, Barbara and Gordon Roehrer found an answer by looking no farther than their own hearts. Barbara and Gordon are music lovers – and that’s an understatement.

Their love goes far beyond just listening to CDs or attending concerts. For years, Barbara has worked as a manager and booking agent for a number of talented local musicians, often spending her free time in small clubs to discover up-and-coming performers. For his part, Gordon is well-known in the Cursillo movement as a music minister and rector. But beyond Cursillo, he is also an accomplished – and much sought-after – bass player for a number of area singer-songwriters when they take the stage or go into a recording studio.

Five years ago, Barbara and Gordon started a concert series at their church, Our Lady of Mercy. They wanted to present accomplished performers who would entertain people on a Saturday night at a modest price. But they also wanted to raise money for a Haitian parish that OLM had long supported with money and volunteers.

What evolved is one of the most professional and respected music clubs in Bergen County – a club that splits its proceeds between the musicians and a fund for children’s scholarships at St. Vincent’s parish school in Vallieres, Haiti. Such artists as Rex Fowler (of Aztec 2 Step), Jen Chapin, Sloan Wainwright, Terence Martin and Red Molly have performed. Even the popular Cursillo music minister Joe McKay has taken the stage as an opening act.

This fall, the Acoustic Café lineup includes The Kennedys, Buskin and Batteau and Freedy Johnson. “I see the café as a way to bring exceptional performers to the community in a listening room environment,” said Barbara.

“The first rollo I ever gave – after numerous stints as music minister – was ‘Environments’,” wrote Gordon in an email. He added that the café has become a “wonderful ‘environmental’ cross-section of performers, parish volunteers, and listeners of all backgrounds – all subject to a ‘Good’ vibe.”

Ever hear the expression God is in the details? This is a story about how I found God, in a small way, while painting our dining room over the summer.

I had just spent a long day, probably about ten straight hours, painting the room's ceiling and walls and priming the trim. I had finally gotten up to the point in my project where I was in the home stretch, applying a coat of gleaming white semi-gloss to the woodwork.

I have no problem working late. It was a little past midnight on a hot summer Saturday night. The room was brightly lit. The screen door wasn't letting in anything that even slightly resembled a breeze. Apparently, though, in my comings and goings through the door, other things were flying into the room unbeknownst to me. Things of a miniscule nature. The random moth and mosquito, for instance.

I was holding a container of paint, applying the white, wet stuff with a new 2" brush I had splurged on. Actually it was a plastic container that had a great ergonomically designed handle built into it. As a matter of fact, in a prior life the container had held Domino Sugar. For some reason I was in kind of a good mood, considering I was into the eleventh hour of a pretty grueling day.

So there I was, slapping the paint on, when I looked down into my yellow container, and was surprised to find a ladybug swimming around, not a snowball's chance of surviving what the little critter had gotten itself into. I thought to myself, "what is a ladybug doing swimming around in my paint?" Of course its colors of orange with black spots were beautiful juxtaposed against the sparkling white paint. It made me think of a time more than thirty years ago when I was painting the outside of my brother-in-law's house one summer, when I had to fend off the wasps and hornets while high up on a ladder. I would talk to them or sing to them and they would keep their distance.

I continued to dip my brush in the paint and apply

it to the woodwork. Every time I looked down to get more paint, the ladybug was slipping further and further away into the sea of white surrounding it. I had reached a critical juncture: would I break my momentum and rescue the critter, or let it slip quietly away to the bottom of my paint container? I think you know the answer. Anyone who talks to hornets is likely to rescue a ladybug in distress.

I went over to the sink just in time to save the poor thing completely covered in white goo. I fished it out, rinsed it off as best I could and brought it over to the screen door. I thought of the movie "Born Free" as I set the poor thing loose outside. I swear it seemed reluctant to leave my company.

In this "at one with nature" event I had experienced a Closest Moment to Christ. I was glad to have made the decision to save the poor thing. It made me think of the concept that the large are supposed to protect the small and that the strong watch out for the weak. That all of us are at some time vulnerable and that all forms of life have their "miracle" aspects. I then thought to myself, "I guess now I've done my good deed for the day." At which point I promptly cleaned up and went to bed. And slept well.

So yes, God is in the details. We paint our lives in a whole series of small strokes and seemingly insignificant moments more than anything else. News stories or testimonials may cover the big milestones, but life is generally about everything that happens in between the marquee events. It's funny how and when God decides to touch us. Say a prayer that we recognize and learn from these little moments.

As for my ladybug friend? I got up the next morning thinking about how it might have made out. Believe it or not, I went over to the screen door and found the ladybug clinging to the outside. While I was compelled to look hard for any trace of white paint, I couldn't find any. Then it flew away. Maybe it was a different ladybug. Or maybe besides being a pretty good painter, I give a mean bug bath.
