Not too long after I made Cursillo, I served on Kitchen Crew (the old name for Service Team), then Team and Service Team more times after that. Serving as Rector for the Men's 171st in 2006 - now that was an amazing experience! I have met many wonderful friends along the way. Grounded, committed, Christ-focused friends. Friends that seem to reflect everything that I see as being great about Cursillo. Its grandeur, majesty and transformative powers. Men and women that unknowingly teach me something about my own personal relationship with God every time we get together. Good, solid soldiers for Christ. Cursillistas that don't know the word "no". My Cursillo brothers and sisters are continually giving of themselves to help others... and paradoxically, they end up being the ones who grow due to their giving.



Father Tom Lipnicki: Cursillo more necessary than ever

During his opening remarks at the May Ultreya, John Ventola referred to the fact that he'll always be known as Sam and Erma's son. He proudly said he was "second generation Cursillo." A few weeks ago, while Pat Carr was speaking to the Men's and Women's Teams for this Fall, he made the same comment: that he is "second generation Cursillo."

I was so glad to hear both of these men speak of the fact that their parents are Cursillistas who inspired or perhaps directed their sons to experience a Cursillo. I ask the question: *where is the third generation Cursillistas?*

Back in the seventies and early eighties, Cursillo of the Archdiocese of Newark held as many as twelve Weekends a year! Now we're grateful to have four and even so, sometimes it's difficult finding enough Candidates to make the Weekend viable. What happened?

When Past Rector Liz Cooper gave the Action Rollo some twenty five years ago, she entered the Rollo Room on a tricycle and then stood up and

shouted: "Give me an 'A!'" "A!" "Give me a 'C!'" "C!" "Give me a 'T!'" "T!" "Give me an 'I!'" "I!" "Give me an 'O!'" "O!" "Give me an 'N!'" "N!" "Whattaya got?" "Action!" "No, you only have the word 'Action.'"

When we gather in Group Reunion, we discuss our Piety, Study, Action and Moment Closest to Christ. I don't want to make any accusations, but maybe we need to brush up on our Action: *make a friend, be a friend, bring a friend to Christ.*

Every one of us knows someone who would benefit from making a Cursillo. In this challenging world where people are exposed to "The Real Housewives of New Jersey" and where a fifteen year old girl is arrested for child pornography for posting pictures of *herself*, an encounter with Jesus on a Cursillo Weekend is more necessary than ever.

When was the last time you sponsored someone to make a Weekend? When was the last time you asked someone to make a Weekend? Instead of Rectors worrying whether or not their Weekend will take place, we should be concerned as to whether or not the

Youth Center can accommodate all the Weekends we need to schedule!

If the apostles hadn't shared the Good News of Jesus Christ with their generation - the folks both older and especially younger than themselves - I would not be writing and you would not be reading this. Cursillo is for everyone, but we especially need the twentysomethings and thirtysomethings to grow closer to the Lord, to learn how they can evangelize their environment and become the Cursillo Leaders of tomorrow.

Today (June 25th) is the anniversary of the Supreme Court's infamous decision that removed prayer from our public schools. That and many other trends and societal changes have made American society increasingly secular. The Spirit of God rests upon us! Let's allow that Spirit to help us change the world: one new Cursillista at a time.

From Our New Assistant Lay Director Jean Kalemba

We plan, God laughs. Not true. We may plan, but God does not laugh or cry; instead God allows nature to take its course. Once the course of nature takes hold, whether it is a joyous celebration of new life or a tragic loss through death, God neither laughs nor cries. Instead a hand of Grace is extended and it is up to us to accept that Grace or turn from it.

My years as a Cursillista have been long and joyous. I have spent

almost half my life trying to live out those final words; "Christ is counting on you, and I am counting on Christ." When Pat's call came, asking me to serve as Assistant Lay Director I hesitated. Pat, I need to take time with this one. Msgr. John Kiley's words of "Say yes, and worry about it later" rang in my ears and my heart, but my mind said, hold on, better think long and hard about this one. If I say yes I will probably become the oldest Assistant Lay Director in the history of the Newark Archdiocese Cursillo (ouch). Everyone knows what we need is new blood, not old slushy stuff. I have responsibilities that usurp Cursillo - home,

family, work...just like you. People are always telling me I have too much to do, slow down, take care of you. But the real reason for my hesitation was not based on responsibilities or age, but actually on fear. Fear that once entered into this journey would I find myself doing God's will or mine; answering God's call or that of my ego.

You already know that prayer is a wonderful thing. I know that too, but often I make deci-

sions without prayer - counting not on God's wisdom and guidance but my own strengths. This time I really knew that would not work; besides the Lenten Season was winding down, what better time for prayer. So I sought out new places and people to pray with. I found powerful prayer in Newark during Blessed Sacraments' Lenten Revival. I traveled to East Rutherford to St. Joseph experiencing humble prayer as feet were washed. I went north to Our Lady of Perpetual Help and experienced deeply moving prayer during the Good Friday's remembrance of Jesus' last words from the cross. On Saturday I came home to Our Lady of Holy

Angels and listened as God's blessings were called down on food prepared for Easter's celebration. Then I got another call. Someone was needed to fill in as Eucharistic Minister for Holy Saturday's Liturgy of the Resurrection; yes I could. On that blessed and holy night, together with my brothers and sisters, I experienced the glorious prayer of the risen Christ. Prayer is a wonderful thing. To experience it in so many different ways is experiencing the powerful presence of God in our lives. So my decision was made. My yes was firm; my worries would have to come later, but not much later.

Since the yes, my life has changed dramatically. I planned, nature took its course. Death came to my family; new responsibilities were brought to my door. But God did not laugh or cry, but extended that hand of Grace. You are that Grace. You continue to be God's Grace made visible in my life. Thank you for allowing me to serve in this new capacity. Continue to pray with me as we travel this journey together. Thy will be done.

Crowds Gather at Spring Ultreyas

The Blessed Mother Room at the Kearny Youth Center was the place to be for two separate Friday night Ultreyas this past spring. Ultreyas, or “the grouping of groups”, bring Cursillistas together to share their faith journeys, and to be fed spiritually by one another.

The format remains the same for all of the Ultreyas we sponsor. A volunteer facilitator, frequently (but not always) a recent past rector, acts as the emcee for the evening. This person calls the meeting to order with a



prayer, leads the group in song and then initiates the Group Reunion portion of the gathering whereby the attendees split up into groups of five or six and share with one another. Relating their Closest Moment to Christ is often times a highlight for this group exercise.

At the conclusion of the Group Reunion, the facilitator calls on a Cursil-



lista “guest speaker” who has prepared a witness talk about how Cursillo has influenced their life and how they live out the Fourth Day message. Another Cursillista is called on to give a brief layperson’s response to the rollo followed by a response to the witness talk by a Spiritual Director.

The formal part of the meeting concludes with prayer and song. There is always time for Cursillista fellowship before the evening is over. All in attendance look forward to this part of the meeting as it gives everyone a chance to catch up with one another. These Ultreyas typically draw 60 or 70 Cursillistas. We’re always looking for new faces!

On March 20, Gordon Roehrer, rector of the Men’s 173rd Cursillo, facilitated the first spring Ultreya gathering. Jack O’Keefe, a candidate from the Men’s 173rd, from St. Paul’s, Ramsey delivered a heart-felt witness. The book The Shack was used as a jumping-off point for Jack’s talk. Vito Lupo, a team member from the Men’s 177th, offered the Lay Response followed by the Spiritual Response by Fr. Charles Grandstrand, Pastor of Our Lady of Mercy, Park Ridge. Fr. Charlie had been a Spiritual Director on the Men’s 173rd.

On May 15, John Ventola, rector of the Men’s 174th Cursillo, facilitated the second spring Ultreya event. John O’Lock, a candidate from the Men’s 174th, from Our Lady of Lourdes, Mountainside gave the keynote witness talk, speaking of the roundabout journey that led him to his wife and to a career in law enforcement. Every person at the event could relate in some way to his witness. James Bukowicz from St. Agnes, Clark, also a candidate on the Men’s 174th, offered a lay response to John’s witness. Fr. Thomas Lipnicki, pastor of Our Lady of Perpetual

Help, Oakland, offered the Spiritual Response to the Witness talk.



An official “Changing of the Guard” ceremony took place at the end of this May Ultreya. Joe Clark concluded his two-year term as Lay Director and passed the baton to Pat Carr for him to serve as the new Lay Director. Fr.
